


The Hoppings

THE weather was kind for the Town Moor Hoppings again this year.

Improved supply of waste bins helped with site cleaning and there was little ground reinstatement required. However the world cup affected numbers attending the event and Car Park receipts were down 21%.

There was some vehicular damage to the service road and repair work has been carried out. Problems, which arose with conduct on site, were brought to the attention of the Showmen and dealt with.

Figures have not been finalised but signs are there will be an operating surplus, which is split 50/50 with the City Council. Once again this year the Town Moor has either hosted or facilitated many events.

committee report

Town Moors.

AFTER a long cold and wet start to the year, conditions changed drastically. The grazing was very good in late spring, then due to the scorching hot weather and lack of rain there was concern about the lack of grass growth (No wonder farmers grumble about the weather!). Some grazers reduced numbers for a period, and recently brought some cows back for the last few weeks. All in all, the beasts have done well this year. This season there were 551 cattle decanted onto the various Town Moors and calvings temporarily lifted the numbers, however mothers and calves are returned to the farm as soon as possible.



Footpaths cycleways

PHASE 1 of the major scheme by the City Council to upgrade the footpaths/cycleways across the Town Moor was completed satisfactorily before the grazing season began. Phase 2 (from Kenton Road/Grandstand Road junction to Claremont Road) will commence as soon as possible following the removal of the cattle on the 31st October. The final stage of Phase 2 incorporates the removal of old lighting columns and the link up and switch on of the new lights and CCTV cameras.



Castle Leases Moor

PLANNING permission was granted for the reinstatement of traditional metal fencing of Castle Leases Moor on 20th April, work began on the specially manufactured posts and rails to reflect the original 19th century specification.

Installation commenced on 2nd October it is an anticipated 3 months programme, at a budget of £117,000. An application for a grant from the Heritage Lottery was refused as it was viewed as being Renovation rather than Preservation, despite there still being a small section of the original fence remaining.

This project will improve the security of grazing stock, hopefully cutting down on repairs and call outs due to vandalism of timer fencing, but above that it is an environmental improvement linking with the Victorian park, which was originally Town Moor land.

Working with the City Council

ARISING out of representation by Mr Fenwick (Chairman of the Stewards Committee) at Guild and also to the Chief Executive and leader of the City Council, a new structure to joint meetings with the City Council Officers has been put in place. The Freemen consider this to be a more open forum with greater transparency and partnership, the first meeting will take place on 24th October 2006. Whilst the terms of reference and inherent powers remain limited and do not reflect those of the former Town Moor Joint Sub Committee this is a positive step forward and is welcomed.

committee report

Nuns Moor (North)

The major reclamation scheme on Nuns Moor, Cowgate steam, (Devils Burn) which primarily involved extensive drainage work has been satisfactorily completed, the improvement is visible! A rustic post and restraining wire fence has been installed to protect both works and cattle. The drainage work and ancillary costs meant a total spend of £42,724.43. Three pedestrian bridges are required to complete the scheme. A specialist bridge manufacturer has been awarded the contract to remove, supply and install the 4m, 6m and 7m bridges, complete with self closing latch gates. The cost of this work is £35,000. The Freemen have received praise from the City Council and rightly so, not only for improvement of the area also covering the cost.

Nuns Moor (South)

Another area of Town Moor which required drainage work to link up runs to the correct catchment pit. This was carried out in September at a cost of and £5,949 there is already a visible improvement to an area, which was subject to ponding.

THE Bill was scheduled to be read in the House of Commons on 20th October, regrettably, the House ran out of time and remaining Bills were deferred. committee report

Dukes Moor

THE Kenton Road /Grandstand Road Allotments site is set to be vacated in December 2006 and a Winter works programme will then progress to incorporate the area into the adjoining Dukes Moor.

Due to vandalism and theft six trees have been replaced, and four new trees have been planted on Dukes Moor and are doing well. To complete the refurbishment of the Blue House landscaping and the driveway facility have been completed. In addition a brick boundary wall adjoining Grandstand Road was constructed to replace the pailing fence line. The garden was planted with environmentally friendly structural shrubs and hedging, the tenant (a member of staff) has introduced his own under planting. The cost of the wall £7,400, planting of both areas, £383 and all in all this has enhanced the area as a whole.

It is hoped that this will give readers a small insight into the unseen work, which is necessary to maintain this vital open space in good condition. It is not always easy, juggling staff time etc., to meet the many demands on the Town Moors whilst still maintaining the grazing pasture and it is the Freeman's grazing rights, enshrined in the Newcastle upon Tyne Town Moor Act, which protect this valuable asset to the City.



St. Mary Magdalene & Holy Jesus Trust

WE wish to bring to the attention of our new readers, and to remind Freeman, that there are vacancies in Freeman designated accommodation in the bungalows of the St. Mary Magdalene & Holy Jesus Trust.

Trustees are appointed by the Church, University of Newcastle upon Tyne, City Council, voluntary sector and the Freeman. The charity exists mainly to provide sheltered housing to those with limited means. All applicants have to meet certain financial criteria, although each application is considered on its own merit. There is an allocation of accommodation afforded to the Freeman of Newcastle upon Tyne over the age of 50 years (married couples or single), or a widow or unmarried daughter of a Freeman living in Newcastle upon Tyne. The definition of "unmarried daughter" also includes a daughter who is a widow or divorcee.

The bungalows in Spital Tongues provide a safe and friendly atmosphere, with home help and personal assistance available to

those who may require these services. There is a main dining room where residents can enjoy a mid-day meal if they do not feel like cooking for themselves and regular social activities are arranged, should you wish to

St. Mary Magdalene & Holy Jesus Trust offers self-contained independent living, set in private landscaped gardens just a short bus ride from the City centre.

Applicants are given every opportunity to look around the Trust's properties and facilities before taking the decision to accept a property. Looking at the location and benefits- this is an opportunity which should be given serious consideration if you are looking to 'downsize' and cut your overheads!

For economic reasons, bungalows allocated to Freeman use can not continue to remain empty and could be reallocated. Should you, or anyone you know who meets the qualifications and may be interested in this accommodation, please contact:

Town Moor Money Charity

UNDER the Newcastle upon Town Moor Act 1988, the Stewards' Committee is empowered to designate a limited proportion of the Town Moor as "Intakes". It is the rents arising from the lease of intakes which provide income for the Town Moor Money Charity.

Grants are available from the Town Moor Money Charity for Freemen of Newcastle upon Tyne, their widows and their daughters. Such grants means tested are made towards living expenses, education or help towards the purchase of mobility aides.

From the age of 18, sons and

daughters of Freemen of Newcastle upon Tyne can apply on their own behalf for assistance in meeting their financial obligations in higher education. However, it is important to remember that a son of a Freeman of Newcastle upon Tyne is eligible to become a Freeman himself at the age of 20 years. Therefore he must take up the freelage if his education grant is to continue past the age of 19 years. As the law stands at the moment, daughters of Freemen are naturally not affected by this stipulation and their grant will automatically continue at 20 years and beyond.



Whether you are a Freeman of Newcastle upon Tyne, a Freeman's widow, daughter or son in need of financial assistance, your application is made in the same way. You must request an official 'green' form from the Senior Steward of the Incorporated Company, which your father's/ late husband's was a member. The Town Moor Money Charity Trustees will require full details, therefore the applicant and the Senior Steward must ensure that the forms are completed correctly. If the required assistance is in connection with higher education, course details should be provided on a separate sheet of paper. The completed form must be returned to your Company Senior Steward who will forward it onto the Trustees for consideration.

Grants for the Town Moor Money Charity are paid out in June and December each year. Once the first grant has been awarded a form will be automatically sent out in time for the next distribution.

In cases of extreme hardship, the Trustees may consider applications outside of the normal distribution dates by calling an Extraordinary Meeting.



Cases have come to light where an applicant has struggled financially for many years, unaware that help was at hand. It is worth completing an application form, the forms are not complicated, and the answer will be a simple 'yes' or 'no'!

Should you be aware of someone within your family who is in need of financial aid, and meets the criteria, please encourage them to apply. Unless they submit the first 'green' application form they will never know if they qualify for assistance!

In the June 2006 distribution, the Town Moor Money Charity paid out £63,337.00 to 211 beneficiaries (33 of whom were students).


Gild Hon. Treasurer before the 11th December.

Lincoln Weekend

SO yet again the jamboree in some far-flung borough, as the Association Freeman of England and Wales held its Annual General Meeting and social weekend. This time, the "yellowbellies" of Lincoln were the generous and amiable hosts.

As we approached Lincolnshire on the drive down, we had our "I-spy" books to hand, but strangely failed to notch up maximum points by spotting any combine harvesters. All

went well until the outskirts of Lincoln itself, whereupon a devilish temporary one-way system conspired to confuse many attendees, including some of the locals! The need for negotiating this hazard was the location of the event hotel, which was right in the city centre and had the most spectacular view of the Cathedral, at least out of our window. Worth the effort around the road-works for that alone.

A varied and interesting cultural

programme complemented the official business, ranging from a tour of Lincoln's tiny, very quaint and genuinely historic Guild Hall to a visit to a modern museum, the most interesting feature of which, to my mind, was a huge aerial photograph of the whole county. Knowing of the importance of Lincolnshire in supporting the efforts of Bomber Command and the US Eighth Air Force in the Second World War, I was interested to count no less

than 52 airfields, or the remains of such, on that photograph.


